The First 10 Days of Dhul-Hijjah

Some days are greater than others

Allaah has blessed the ummah like no other before. One of the blessings that Allaah has given us is certain times of year in which even small acts of worship are rewarded in abundance such as Laylatul-qadar, or the six fasts of Shawaal. These periods of the year are in reality gifts from Allaah that He has given to us. From such blessed times in which worship is abundantly and hugely rewarded are the first ten days of Dhul Hijjah.

This is the twelfth month of the Islamic calendar during which the Muslims perform Hajj. There are no other days which are rewarded like these ten days. Sadly, many Muslims do not realise the greatness and superiority and virtues of these ten days and treat these days like any other day. Yet there is much in the Quran and Sunnah about the ten days of Dhul Hijjah. So the true believer rushes to do good in these days and is extra cautious to stay away from sins. "And hasten to forgiveness from your Lord and a Garden - its width (is like that of) the heavens and the earth prepared for the pious". (3:133)

Allaah doesn't just mention to ask for forgiveness, He tells us to rush to do it. Also, any sin done in these days is more severe and more hated by Allaah, than sins done at other times. Allaah said: "So do not oppress yourselves within these days". [09:36]

Big rewards for small actions

One of the virtues of these ten days is that any action done in these ten days is greater and more beloved to Allaah than all of the other days. Two rakaat prayed in these 10 days is more rewarding than any other day of the year. Giving charity, fasting or any action is more beloved in these 10 days.

Ibn 'Abbaas reported that the Prophet (salalahu alaihi wa sallam) said: "There are no days in which righteous deeds are more beloved to Allaah than these ten days." The people asked, "Not even jihaad for the sake of Allaah?" He said, "Not even jihaad for the sake of Allaah, except in the case of a man who went out to fight giving himself and his wealth up for the cause and came back with nothing." (al-Bukhaari).

Better than the last ten days of Ramadan?

Shaykh al-Islaam Ibn Taymiyyah was asked: which are the most virtuous: the first ten days of Dhul Hijjah or the last ten nights of Ramadan. He replied by saying:

"The first ten days of Dhul Hijjah are the best days throughout the year, even better than the last ten days of Ramadan. However, the last ten nights of Ramadan are the best nights in the year including the first ten nights in Dhul Hijjah". So, if we take advantage of these ten days, just as if we take advantage of Laylatul-qadar, the scholars say it as if you have lived many lives in worship.

Four great virtues of these 10 days

1. Allaah swears an oath by these ten days

Swearing an oath by something is an indication of its importance in the sight of Allaah. Allaah says: "By the dawn; by the ten nights" [al-Fajr 89:1-2].

Ibn 'Abbaas said that this refers to the first ten days and ten nights of Dhul Hijjah.

2. In these ten days Allaah completed His religion.

This was done on the Day of Arafah which is the 9th Dhul Hijjah. Narrated Tariq bin Shibab: Some Jews said, "Had this verse been revealed to us, we would have taken that day as Eid."

'Umar said, "What verse?" They said:— "This day I have Perfected your religion for you, Completed My Favour upon you And have chosen for you Islam as your religion" (5.3) 'Umar said, "I certainly know the place where it was revealed; It was revealed while Allaah's Apostle was staying at 'Arafat on a Friday" (Bukhari).

Al-Tabari mentions that "When the aayah, "This day, I have perfected your religion for you..." was revealed, during the great day of Hajj (the Day of `Arafah) `Umar cried. The Prophet said, `What makes you cry' He said, `What made me cry is that our religion is being perfected for us. Now it is perfect, nothing is perfect, but it is bound to deteriorate.' The Prophet said, "You have said the truth."

The Day Of Arafah is the day on Which Allaah Took The Covenant From The Progeny Of Adam.

Allaah says: And (remember) when your Lord brought forth from the Children of Adam, from their loins, their seed and made them testify as to themselves (saying): "Am I not your Lord?" They said: "Yes! We testify," lest you should say on the Day of Resurrection: "Verily, we have been unaware of this." [al-A`raaf 7:172]

Allaah took a covenant with all of mankind with the fact that He is their Lord and that they have no other lord or deity but Him. This covenant took place in Arafah: They said,

"Yes, we have testified." Therefore, it is no longer acceptable to say on the Day of Judgment that they forgot and were unaware of the covenant, or to claim that their fathers made shirk and they, being their descendants, thus followed them. The shirk of one's father is not an excuse for someone to deviate from the covenant of the fitrah. This covenant is between them and Allaah, and their fathers have nothing to do with it. However, it is out of the Mercy of Allaah that He does not bring people to account by virtue of the covenant of the fitrah alone but after sending messengers to invite them to Allaah. Allaah Almighty says:

"[We Sent] messengers as bringers of good tidings and warmers so that mankind will have no argument against Allaah after the messengers. And ever is Allaah Exalted in Might and Wise." [4:165]

4) These 10 days also include the Eid al Adha which is known as Yawm al-Nahar (Day of Sacrifice).

This day of Eid is the greatest day of the entire year and the greatest day of Hajj, which combines many acts of worship in a way unlike any other day. The Messenger of Allaah (salalahu alaihi wa sallam) said: "The most excellent days with Allaah is the day of an-Nahr (i.e Eid ul Adha)". (Abu Dawud authenticated by al-Albaanee)

What to do in these 10 days

Reciting tasbeeh, tahmeed, tahleel and takbeer abundantly.

Allaah says: "and mention the name of Allaah on appointed days." [al-Hajj 22:28] Ibn Abbaas said: "The 'appointed days' are the first ten days (of Dhul Hijjah)" The Prophet (salalahu alaihi wa sallam) said: "There are no days greater in the sight of Allaah and in which righteous deeds are more beloved to Him than these ten days, so during this time recite a great deal of Tahleel (La-ilaaha-ill-Allaah), Takbeer (Allaahu-Akbar) and Tahmeed (Alhamdulillah)." (Ahmad).

This should be at all times; in your car, at home, and when walking. Bukhaari mentioned about Ibn 'Umar and Abu Hurayrah that: "the two of them used to go out to the market place during the ten days of Dhul Hijjah saying 'Allaahu-Akbar', causing the people to also say it."

The Prophet (salalahu alaihi wa sallam) said "The best supplication offered is on day of 'Arafah and the best that I and the Prophets before me uttered is;

Laa Ilaaha Ilal-Ilaah, Wahdahu Laa Shareeka Lahu, Lahul-Mulk Wa Lahul-Hamd Wa Huwa 'Alaa Kulli Shay'in Qadeer". (Tirmidhi. Authenticated by al-Albaanee).

Also from dhikr is reading Quran. Whatever your daily portion of Quran is, increase it and if you are not accustomed to read the Quran daily, then use this as an opportunity to start.

2. Fasting the 9 days of Dhul Hijjah.

The Prophet (salalahu alaihi wa sallam) used to fast on the first nine days of Dhul Hijjah. One of the wives of the Prophet said: The Prophet used to fast on the first nine days of Dhul Hijjah and the day of 'Ashoora', and three days each month, the first Monday of the month and two Thursdays. (Saheeh Abi Dawood).

It is also Sunnah to fast on the ninth day of Dhul Hijjah (the day before Eid, known as the day of Arafah).

The Messenger of Allaah (salalahu alaihi wa sallam) was asked about fasting on the day of 'Arafah and he said: "I ask Allaah that it may expiate for (the sins of) the year that comes before it and the year that comes after it."

Therefore we should try our utmost to fast all the blessed 9 days of Dhul Hijjah – particularly the 9th of Dhul Hijjah which is the day of Arafah. If not then we should at least fast as many as we can possibly can as we may not get this opportunity again next year as life is uncertain and we should never procrastinate on doing good actions. Also encourage your family and friends to join in!

3. Performing Hajj and 'Umrah.

One of the best deeds that one can do during these ten days is to perform Hajj to the Sacred House of Allaah. The one whom Allaah helps to go on Hajj to His House and to perform all the rituals properly is included in the words of the (salalahu alaihi wa sallam):

"An accepted Hajj brings no less a reward than Paradise."

4. Giving much in charity.

As the rewards of doing good deeds during these days are increased significantly then we should also give as much as we can in charity. Allaah promised forgiveness of our sins if we give in charity and give to the poor and needy. He honoured our charity and described it as a " beautiful loan to Allah " to emphasise that we are doing something good that He loves, and that He himself will pay our loan back to us doubled:

"If ye loan to Allah a beautiful loan, He will double it to your (credit), and He will grant you Forgiveness: for Allah is Most Ready to appreciate (service), Most Forbearing." [Surah At-Taghabun 64:17]

5. Offering the Qurbani.

Also known as udhiyah. A camel, cow, sheep or goat is slaughtered after the Eid prayer, as an act of worship, intending to draw closer to Allaah. This is legislated for the Day of Eid (10th) and the Days of Tashreeq (11th, 12th and 13th) For further details, see the FAQ on Qurbani.

6. Sincere repentance.

One of the most important things to do during these ten days is to repent sincerely to Allaah and to give up all kinds of disobedience and sin. Repentance means coming back to Allaah and foregoing all the deeds, open and secret, that He dislikes, out of regret for what has passed, giving it up immediately and being determined never to return to it, but to adhere firmly to the truth by doing what Allaah loves. If a Muslim commits a sin, he must hasten to repent at once, without delay, firstly because he does not know when he will die, and secondly because one evil deed leads to another. Hasan al-Basri said: "If the slave of Allaah sinned and then he repented, he only gets closer to Allaah."

Repentance is obligatory at all times, but when the Muslim combines sincere repentance with good deeds during these days of great virtue, this is a sign of success, in sha Allaah. Keenness to do good deeds causes a person to regret his sins. "But as for him who repented, believed and did righteous deeds, then he will be among those who are successful." [al-Qasas 28:67]

We should busy ourselves in Dua during these 10 blessed days and nights particularly on the night and day of Arafat which is the 9th of Dhul Hijjah. Duas are also readily accepted during fasting, especially just before Suhur ends and just before breaking the fast.

7. Eid Prayer.

It is incumbent for the Muslim (who is not making Hajj) to make every effort to perform the `Eid Prayer wherever it is performed, and to be present for the Khutbah and benefit.

Finally

We should make sure that we do not miss this important occasion, because time is passing quickly. Occupy yourself at this blessed time by worshipping Allaah, praying, reading Qur'an, remembering Allaah, making du'a, giving charity, honouring your parents, upholding the ties of kinship, enjoining what is good and forbidding what is evil, and other good deeds and acts of worship. Hasten to do good works before death strikes, before you regret your negligence and failure to act, before you are trapped with your deeds in the grave.

The Day of 'Arafah

The Prophet Muhammad (Peace and Blessings of Allah be upon him) said:
"The best Du'a is Du'a on the day of 'Arafah and the best that I and the Prophets
before me said is

'Laa ilaaha illallaah wahdahu la shareeka lah, lahu'l-mulku wa lahu'l-hamdu wa huwa 'ala kulli shay'in qadeer."

(There is none worthy of worship but Allaah alone, with no partner or associate; His dominion, to him belongs all praise and He has power over all things).

(Al-Tirmidhi)

The Prophet Muhammad (Peace and Blessings of Allah be upon him) said: "Fasting the day of 'Arafah expiates the sins of two years: the past one and the coming one."
